



### PURPOSE

The purpose of this framework is to outline Mount Waverley Primary School's organisation, implementation and review of curriculum and teaching practices and to ensure that, taken as a whole, all eight learning areas are substantially addressed, unless an exemption applies.

The framework shows, at a high level, how the school will deliver its curriculum, how the curriculum and teaching practice will be reviewed, how we assess student learning, how we record and monitor of student performance, and when and how we report to parents.

This curriculum framework should be read alongside our whole school, year level and lesson curriculum plans.

### OVERVIEW

Mount Waverley Primary School provides all students with a planned and structured curriculum to equip them with the knowledge, skills and attributes needed to complete their schooling and to make a successful transition from school to work, training, or further education.

Mount Waverley Primary School is committed to offering a comprehensive curriculum based on the [Victorian Curriculum F-10](#). The key points in this framework, and in line with the [F-10 Revised Curriculum Planning and Reporting Guidelines](#), are a commitment to:

- A defined curriculum content is the basis for student learning
- Curriculum planning that is based on two-year bands of schooling rather than each year level
- Developing and publishing a separate whole-school curriculum plan that documents our teaching and learning program
- Reporting student learning against the achievement standards in the curriculum
- Reporting student learning to students and parents in line with the Department's [Reporting Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10](#) policy.

The core purpose of this school as defined in the Strategic Plan is to provide an inclusive, rigorous learning environment that challenges and engages young people to grow as passionate learners. The school seeks to develop motivated, creative and independent learners who demonstrate strong social values and whose leadership, resilience and self-esteem is evident when interacting with the community. The school provides a comprehensive curriculum with a strong focus on literacy and numeracy, and teaching is delivered through our whole school Instructional model of the 'Best Lesson'.

Mount Waverley Primary School provides all students with a planned and structured curriculum to equip them with the knowledge, skills and attributes needed to complete their schooling and to make a successful transition from school to work, training or further education.

Mount Waverley Primary School is committed to lifelong learning by providing an inclusive, supportive and nurturing community in which diversity is valued and celebrated. Our innovative curriculum and culture of excellence creates a stimulating learning environment that engages and challenges students to achieve personal success and make positive contributions to society. Our school encourages students to strive for excellence in all of their endeavours. At Example School our 21st century curriculum presents students with the opportunity to

develop deep understandings on a range of concepts throughout their school lives. Our broad curriculum is planned and taught sequentially and allows students to have some ownership in all aspects of their learning. It is designed to develop thinking and social skills, foster engagement with the wider community and include use of a wide variety of technology to assist in student learning. To support the delivery of the curriculum at our school we access and select a wide range of suitable educational resources, set homework that enhances classroom learning and undertake a range of student assessment and reporting activities.”

## IMPLEMENTATION

Mount Waverley Primary School implements its curriculum taking into consideration the needs of our students. We teach to the point of need, as indicated by the student data that is analysed in PLC Common Planning meetings. This includes classroom teachers and specialist classes (Art, Music, PE, LOTE, Library, Global Learning and STEM).

- *All students undertake year-long programs in English, Mathematics and Physical Education*
- *All students undertake STEM across all year levels*
- *All students undertake all Humanities disciplines (history, geography, citizens and citizenship, economics and business), with history as a core semester learning program and elective options across the humanities.*
- *All students undertake at least one Arts discipline*
- *All students undertake a language (Japanese)*
- *Humanities and technologies key learning areas are completed in inquiry sessions*

At Mount Waverley Primary School, class time is structured into a weekly timetable, with 5 hours of learning per day, broken into 5 x 60-minute sessions.

Further information on how our school implements the curriculum, including the learning areas provided at each year level/band of schooling, and the capabilities that are developed by students across these learning areas and the approximate time allocations for each learning area, is provided in our whole school, year level and unit / lesson curriculum plans.

### 1. Language provision

Mount Waverley Primary School will deliver Japanese as a Language.

### 2. Pedagogy

The pedagogical approach at Mount Waverley Primary School focuses on creating an engaging and inclusive learning environment through evidence-based teaching practices, aligned with FISO 2.0 and VTLM 2.0 to enhance student learning outcomes. Teachers consistently implement evidence-based practices such as explicit teaching, differentiated instruction, and ongoing formative assessment to cater to diverse learning needs. By fostering critical thinking and promoting active participation, the school aims to empower students to become independent and lifelong learners.

### 3. Assessment

Mount Waverley Primary School assesses student progress in line with the Department’s [Assessment of Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10](#) policy.

Students at Mount Waverley Primary School will have multiple and varied opportunities to demonstrate learning and achievement. Teachers use assessment tasks that cover multiple curriculum levels to ensure that evidence of learning and growth is captured for every student.

At Mount Waverley Primary School, student learning is assessed as part of the school-based curriculum program through a balanced use of both formative and summative assessments. Formative assessment is embedded in daily teaching practices, with teachers regularly monitoring student progress through observations, questioning, and ongoing feedback to inform and adjust instruction. Summative assessments, including tests, projects, and standardised assessments, are conducted at key points to evaluate student achievement against curriculum

standards, ensuring a comprehensive understanding of each student's learning growth and progress. This approach aligns with the Assessment of Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10 policy, promoting continuous improvement in student outcomes.

- Teachers at Mount Waverley Primary School use a combination of formative assessment for learning (to focus feedback and guide future learning) and summative assessment of learning (to determine what the student has learned at the end of a sequence of learning), alongside student self-assessment and reflection.
- Assessment is used in an ongoing way, to guide future lessons and learning, as well as to keep students and parents informed of student progress.
- Teachers will use a variety of assessment strategies to gather evidence about student achievement. The agreed assessment processes and tasks are documented in the Subject Unit Designs and Learning Sequences. The assessments may include, but are not limited to, tests and assignments, projects, portfolios, performances, discussions or student-teacher conferences.
- Assessment tasks are developed to support students to show their knowledge, skills and understandings and will include clear instructions, relevant supporting documents (scaffolds, planning documents, etc) and allow sufficient time for completion. Teachers will make modifications to the task to cater for students with additional learning needs.
- Mount Waverley Primary School will develop Individual Education Plans (IEPs) for students who are part of the Program for Students with a Disability (PSD) or Disability Inclusion (DI), Koorie students and students in 'Out of Home' care, in consultation with students, parents and where appropriate, with outside agencies.
- Teachers will assess the achievements of students with disabilities and impairments in the context of the Victorian Curriculum and the 'Towards Foundation Level Victorian Curriculum' where applicable.
- The English language proficiency of English as Additional Language EAL students will be assessed using the Victorian Curriculum F-10 EAL.
- Where possible, staff will participate in cross marking of assessment tasks (moderation) involving assessment rubrics and work samples so that staff can apply consistent judgements of student progress against Victorian Curriculum Standards across the school.

#### 4. Reporting

Mount Waverley Primary School reports student progress to parents in line with the Department's [Reporting Student Achievement and Progress Foundation to 10](#) policy. In addition, Mount Waverley Primary School ensures that there is continuous sharing of assessment information formally and informally with parents/carers throughout the term/semester, including through twice-annual formal reporting.

At Mount Waverley Primary School progress reports are issued to parents in both terms 2 and 4. Parent/Teacher interviews are conducted in terms 1 and 3 where parents are invited to discuss their child's progress by making an appointment with their teacher.

The progress report will be in a written format easy for parents/carers to understand and will be accessible in digital form with the option to translate text from English to another language, to cater to our school community.

- Mount Waverley Primary School will report directly against the Victorian [Curriculum F-10 achievement standards](#).
- Both student achievement and progress will be included in the report.
- An age-related five-point scale, where the quality of a student's achievement against what is 'expected' for students of that year level at the time of reporting, will be used for reporting against the achievement standards in English, Mathematics and Science (where applicable).
- Opportunities will be provided for parents/carers and students to discuss the school report with teachers and/or school leaders.

Parent-teacher interviews, conducted twice-yearly, enable the opportunity to discuss the students' progress and how they can continue to be supported at home. Interpreting services will be made available where required.

## 5. Curriculum and teaching practice review

School curriculum and teaching practice is reviewed against the [Framework for Improving of Student Outcomes \(FISO 2.0\)](#). FISO and the FISO improvement cycle help identify focus areas for improvement and to evaluate the impact of introduced initiatives.

### Review of school curriculum

### Review of teaching practice

- Professional Learning Communities, which link the learning needs of students with the professional learning and practice of teachers and provide an opportunity for teachers to collaboratively evaluate the effect of high impact teaching strategies; and
- the Performance Development cycle, which provides an opportunity to provide feedback to teaching staff on their performance to support ongoing learning and development, with a focus on how student learning can be improved through improving teaching practice.
